NEW BID TO CURB

INJURIES

THERE'S a new user-friendly report form aimed at helping prevent accidents.

New government Health and Safety Executive rules for reporting injuries and violence to employees mean it's vital that staff are aware of the importance of reporting.

The form – the product of a Service working group – is available in all stations and departments. Staff must report all accidents and violent incidents at the earliest possible opportunity.

Proactive

They also have to record them in their station or department accident and occurrence books.

Sue Woodward, assistant personnel officer said: "The Trust wants a proactive approach to the prevention of accidents. We work as a team, and there is a mutual responsibility for each other's health and safety. It's in everyone's interest to report and prevent accidents."

And another working group – chaired by station officer Arthur Jamison – is examining the increasing level of violence affecting crews on the road.

The working group's task is to define violence – and how to deal with it when it occurs. So far, they've discussed the different forms of violence, including physical, verbal and unintentional.

There's also 'perceived' violence – when a member of staff feels threatened by a situation.


Victim Support

The group will be recommending training on prevention – spotting potentially violent situations and then 'handling' them.

They will also discuss victim support for those unlucky enough to be assaulted.

The findings will be presented to the Management Executive Team.

part of a training visit. Geoff said: "ParaTed helps calm down distressed and frightened children. It's good to know he'll be spreading the message across the Atlantic."


THE STAFF Suggestion Scheme continues to produce bright

Wilford ambulance technician John Sneap suggested cutting the running times of the extractor fans at his station by 15 minutes; and changing the timing so that they only activate SCHEME once the automatic garage shutter doors are closing.

The exhaust fumes would then be safely cleared, and running costs cut. The fans would work for only five minutes, and suck in less cold air (this used to trigger the overhead heaters). **Both suggestions have been used at Wilford, and are being** considered for other stations with similar doors.

The change in the timing of the fans will result in a saving of £420 per year for the Trust, with even greater savings predicted.
