**THE Patient Satisfaction** Survey has turned into a giant pat on the back for staff.

Ninety eight per cent of 800 patients who returned questionnaires said the care they received was as good as expected. And over half said it was 'even better' than anticipated.

The annual survey covers expectations of levels of care plus the quality of vehicles and staff- for both PTS and A&E ambulance crews as well as control staff.

Only five per cent of PTS patients felt the journey time was longer than expected. Almost all respondents said the ambulance staff were helpful, friendly, polite and well dressed. The only problem highlighted was personal communication, caused by hearing difficulties.

Over 97% per cent also rated the ambulances as clean, comfortable and safely driven.

Control staff have been equally popular. Twenty one per cent of emergency patients called their own ambulances - and none of them had a single criticism. In fact, around 90 per cent said staff were polite, helpful, sympathetic and competent.

Ninety six per cent thought ambulance crews were professional, compassionate, polite and attentive. And of

the 68 per cent who received clinical treatment while 'on board', 93 per cent were very satisfied; six per cent were fairly satisfied; and only one per cent were dissatisfied.

Chief executive Mike Handy said: "I'm sure all our staff are proud to have had such a vote of confidence. Although there's always room for improvement, this is a great achievement. It's clear an excellent job is being done. Congratulations!"

NOTTINGHAMSHIRE'S new air ambulance - a joint venture with the Lincolnshire Ambulance Trust - was officially launched in a high profile ceremony at Wollaton Hall, Nottingham on 25 April.

The helicopter carried out a simulated accident and emergency incident (pictured) in front of BBC and Central television crews and a large turnout of the rest of the regional news media.

Nichola Vincent has been appointed as the Notts fundraiser and she will be in post at King's Mill by mid June.

### UPDATES RADIO SCHEME

THE radio replacement programme is on target. Headquarters staff will have noticed lots of wiring and cardboard boxes appearing in Control.

This is the hardware which is rather technical to explain in detail. But it's currently being installed in a carefully



co-ordinated programme by DOPRA technicians. The new consoles have now been installed, and control staff will be able to use start-of-the-art technology like touch screen dialling to contact stations.

And to make sure everyone knows exactly how the radio system will work, a question and answer fact sheet has been issued.

It will be followed by further sheets on other important developments including criteria-based despatch, zonal cover and fast response paramedics.



#### CLINICAL AUDIT

THE new-look Patient Report Forms have been introduced, enabling the computer system to give an immediate analysis of outcomes. The views of staff will be taken into account when the design of the forms is reassessed in the near future.

### WORK PRESSURES AUDIT


