OVER the past three years there has been a steady increase in Accident & Emergency calls in Nottinghamshire.

SURGE

The Service is now one of the busiest in the UK and a possible further increase of almost seven per cent is predicted this current year.

However, the Service is not alone. This phenomenon is part of a national trend which is shared with

other ambulance services and accident and emergency departments.

Director of operational services Pat Slevin said: "We can only speculate what the causes are, there are no ambulance service. Television firm facts."

Skills

Possible reasons include:

★A change in policy for chest pain victims. Doctors call an ambulance immediately rather than visit the patient. This however, would only have a marginal effect.


YSTERY

UPDATED TERMS & CONDITIONS OVER 50s AGREEMENT

THE over 50s agreement has been renewed.

The updated terms and conditions, linking the package with the Trust contract, has been approved and signed by the chief executive and the chair of the staff-side committee.

The agreement - originally set up in the late 80s - recognises the stresses placed on paramedics and technicians and gives them the opportunity at 50 to move to dayonly shifts without affecting their pay and conditions.

Guaranteed

Of course there has to be a vacancy before someone can move onto the scheme but all staff are guaranteed a permanent duty line.

The number of placements has been reduced to 12 to take into account the non-emergency staffing reductions over the years.

Benefits

Director of personnel Bozena Benton said: "At present there are nine people enjoying the benefits of the scheme and both management and staff welcome the renewal of the agreement."

CONCERN FOLLOWS

THE latest 'mystery patient' revealed survey has inconsistencies in the service provided by a taxi company which regularly transports patients.

Now, the Service is taking action to try to eliminate the problems.

A CHC member - disguised as an out-patient - gave full marks to the inward journey driver but was less impressed with the outward journey. She said, of her inward

journey: "The driver was very patient and pleasant, even when delayed at a Nursing Home, due a patient not being to ready."However, she noted the driver exceeded the speed limit to ensure the patient arrived punctually at the Queens Medical Centre.

Failed

On the outward journey, out of 18 questions, the driver failed to meet the criteria in three major areas.

These were:

★No appropriate assistance was given to help her to the vehicle.

★The driver was not wearing a name badge.

★She was not seen safely into her home by the driver on



return from hospital.

The CHC member said: "The driver was pleasant, but not helpful to two patients who were having difficulties."

Although waiting time for transport after treatment was only 20 minutes, she also noted that the driver exceeded the speed limit and that he should have offered more assistance and seen the patients safely into their homes.

Concerned

Scheme co-ordinator and ambulance liaison officer John Adkin said: "We have to be concerned if our Patient Charter standards and our contract terms and agreements are not always being met.

"I am meeting the firm's director to discuss how we can work in partnership, and address the points raised."

COPING AGAINST ALL THE ODDS

★ Continued from page one performance table showed the Trust's accident and emergency service to be the best in the entire Trent Region, and joint sixth in the UK.

Pat said: "We are coping well against the odds. But in certain areas we are finding it continuously hard to meet national standards. For instance, in Nottingham Health Authority's district we should be reaching 95% of calls within 14 minutes, but we are actually reaching 95% within 15 minutes."

Positive actions are being taken to keep the situation under control. Purchasers recognise the problem and talks are taking place with them.

"We have increased deployed resources by 27 shifts a week as a result of the ORH Report. And we have built on this by adding a further 20 shifts a week, funded by Nottingham Health Authority," said Pat.

The Service is also looking at ways, from

within its own resources, of immediately reinforcing operational cover on a temporary basis.

On a more permanent basis, the Service is negotiating to introduce additional resources to deal with the sustained increase.

A national investigation is going ahead into the rise in emergency admissions. And the Trust's management executive are considering whether the Service should initiate its own research and development project with the aim to identify the root causes.



FIT FOR THE FUNDRAISING ROAD
